The library is also the first in the state to provide internet facility to a college campus. Since 1996, e-mail and web browsing facilities are being offered to staff and students of the college.

Every aspect of library functioning is managed by the indigenously developed multiuser, multi-platform library software LCP (Library Control Programme). Important library functions like books selection, accessioning, cataloguing, classification, search, retrieval, circulation, membership management etc. are controlled by LCP. Members can search, reserve, review and recommend books in the OPAC terminals provided in the library. Secured Wi-Fi internet facility also is available in the library.
