1. PROFILE OF THE COLLEGE

Mar Athanasius College (Autonomous), affiliated to M.G. University, Kottayam was established in 1955. The college is owned and managed by Mar Athanasius College Association which was constituted in 1953 under the Cochin Registration of Scientific and Charitable Societies Act. Mar Athanasius College started functioning on 14 July 1955. The formal inauguration of the college was done by His Majesty Haile Selassie I, the Emperor of Ethiopia, on 30 October, 1956. The initial financial assistance for the college was provided by the Mar Thoman Cheriya Pally, Kothamangalam and the shareholders of the Association. A generous contribution from the Emperor of Ethiopia also immensely helped the Association in establishing the college. It is constructed in 30 acres of land on a green hillock by the side of the Kothamangalam-Muvattupuzha road, about one kilometer away from Kothamangalam town and 55 kms to the east of Kochi. It extends between latitudes 10.0558° N and longitudes 76.6183° E. The built up area of the campus, is about 1,67,022.19 sqft. The library area comes to 31,306.34 sqft. The college also has a multi-purpose stadium cum auditorium (Baselios Paulose Indoor Stadium) with an area of 10,000 sqft.

From its humble beginning, Mar Athanasius College has become one of the prestigious centers of higher learning in Kerala. The College offers 13 undergraduate programmes (12 aided and one self-financing), 2 vocational undergraduate programmes, 17 postgraduate programmes (8 aided and 9 self-financing), one aided integrated postgraduate programme in Basic Sciences (Biology) and 5 doctoral programmes leading to Ph.D (Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Economics and Commerce). Certificate courses and value added courses in life sciences, humanities and commerce are offered to acquire competency in the essential job-readiness skills. Presently, the college encompasses around 2000 students, 132 teaching faculty and 67 non-teaching staff. The college provides state-of-the-art infrastructure to facilitate teaching-learning process. 22 laboratories in tune with modern specifications function in the Departments of Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Data Analytics and Bio-Sciences. Of these, five are research laboratories to carry out research in science. The college has two instrumentation centres to house sophisticated instruments. Two air-conditioned seminar halls, a Network Resource Centre, Academic Technology Centre, a Language lab and a Mathematics lab function in the college. A multi-storied, full-fledged library with 72093 books, 54 periodicals,

35 journals, 13 newspapers, 6000+ e-journals and 199500+ e-books are provided to meet the academic and research requirements of the faculty, students and research scholars. Since its establishment, the faculty of the college has undertaken 11 Major Research projects and about 40 Minor Research projects funded by various agencies such as UGC, DST, KSCSTE, ICSSR, MHRD etc.

In commensurate with the academic facilities, futuristic infrastructure amenities are provided to develop and improve the co-curricular talents of the students. Indoor Stadium, Indoor Shooting Range, a 400 m and 200 m ground, an Olympic Size Swimming Pool (50× 25 ×2m) and a multi gymnasium are provided to inculcate sports culture among its students and thus aid in their wholesome development. The college has two ladies' hostel, a sports men's hostel, an international men's hostel with facilities for accommodating 200, 50 and 50 students respectively. The college offers value added and skill development courses in various disciplines. College has various clubs and forums like drama club, film club, quiz club, music club, dance club, debate club, nature club etc for the upliftment of students' talents. The college also offers international/national faculty and student exchange programmes.

The college has the rare distinction of being the first college in Kerala to be accredited with 'A' grade by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council in 2002. 'A' grade was retained in 2012, second cycle of accreditation. Acknowledging the achievements of the college, in its third cycle of accreditation in 2017, NAAC accorded 'A+' grade to the institution with CGPA 3.52. The University Grants Commission conferred Autonomy to the college in 2016. 'College with Potential for Excellence' status was conferred in 2009 and was later extended up to 31 March 2019 by the UGC. The college was ranked in 87th, 56th position and 86th positions in NIRF 2023, 2022 and 2021 college ranking respectively. The college, in 2019, was one among the seventeen colleges in India to receive five crores rupees under the RUSA scheme to usher transformative reforms in the higher education system. Four departments –Physics, Chemistry, Botany and Zoology- received financial assistance from the Govt. of India under DBT Star Scheme in 2019 later extended to 2024. The college was selected for Unnath Bharath Abhiyan as part of the MHRD scheme to enhance the living standards of the people in nearby villages and municipalities. The college selected five villages- Kothamangalam, Keerampara, Pindimana, Varappetty and Thrikkariyoor – as part of the scheme. The UGC, under the

Paramarsh scheme, has also identified the college as a potential mentor to nearby educational institutions to acquire accreditation. The college renders its services to five Mentee institutions- Mar Athanasius College of Engineering (Kothamangalam), Mar Baselios Institute of Technology and Science (Nellimattom), Mar Baselios College (Adimaly), Mount Carmel College of Arts and Science (Karukadom) and Mar Elias College, (Kottappady). The college celebrated its decennial, silver, golden and diamond jubilee with all splendor in 1965, 1981, 2004 and 2015 respectively.

Over the last two decades, Mar Athanasius College has won many prestigious titles comprising two national awards and six state awards. For its eco- friendly activities including rain water harvesting projects, the college has won many prestigious awards instituted by various accredited bodies like Government departments, popular newspapers, bio- diversity boards and other environmental agencies. The college is the recipient of Palathully Award (2007), National Environmental Awareness Award (2008), Bhoomimithra Award (2009), Green Award (2010), One district, One Green Champion Award (2020- 21) Higher Education Minister's Excellence Award (2022), and Manorama Trophy (2019 & 2021). Dr. Winny Varghese, former Principal of the college, was honoured with Dr. Sam Higginbottom Award for the best Principal of India (2009) instituted by All India Association for Christian Higher Education (AIACHE), New Delhi. Dr. Manju Kurian, Principal was honoured in 2023 with Berchmans Award and Fr. Dr. Jose Thekkan Award for the best teacher in the State instituted by Kuwait Alumni Chapter of SB College Changanassery and Christ College Irinjalakuda respectively. The college is often recognized as one of the best NSS unit by the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports for its outstanding work done under NSS. Awards have also been conferred to the programme officers who coordinate the activities of the unit.

Mar Athanasius College has made sterling achievements in the field of sports and games. The Sports Council of Kerala selected the college as the 'Best College in Sports' in 2014. The college was accredited by KHELO India as its center in Athletics. The Sports Authority of India (SAI) chose the college as a sub- center in Athletics (2007). The college athletic team has won the university championship for fifteen times and has been the runners up for three years. The Women athletics team was the champions in 2021 and runners up in 2020. For eight times, the College won the University Championship in Football and was the University champions in Volleyball for four times. The college won the University Championship in

cross country race for nine times; won the University Championship in Swimming (Men) for five times; won the University Championship in Swimming (Women) for four times. For consecutive years from 2017 to 2021, the college won the University Championship in Water Polo (Men). Since 2019, Mar Athanasius Football Academy has been participating in the Professional Football League organised by Kerala Football Association. Mar Athanasius College is the only college in Kerala participating in a professional league. The college has also produced 26 international athletes including two Olympians – Anilda Thomas and T. Gopi. Eldhose Paul and Abdulla Aboobacker won Gold and Silver in Commonwealth Games for India in 2022. Eldhose Paul was honoured with Arujuna Award in 2023.

2. COLLEGE MANAGEMENT

Mar Athanasius College Association was constituted as a society registered under the Cochin Registration of Literary, Scientific and Charitable Societies Act. The second venture of this charitable society is Mar Athanasius College of Engineering in 1961. The Association has also initiated a college at Adimali, Mar Baselious College, in 2003, for the benefit of students in high ranges. In tune with ‘catch them young’ policy, the association also offers a broad and stimulating international educational experience at Mar Athanasius International School to groom the budding talents as global citizens. These institutions have made headway in all disciplines on account of the untiring efforts of several stalwarts, particularly that of Prof. M. P. Varghese, the dynamic visionary who headed these institutions to glory through the years as the Secretary of the College Association. Under their able and devoted leadership, the association is marching ahead with unparalleled success. The clear vision, firm determination and utmost dedication of its charioteers and the abundant blessings of God Almighty have enabled the college to make significant strides and establish itself as a centre of excellence in the field of higher education.

Mar Athanasius College Association has now more than 360 shareholders, a governing body consisting of 62 members elected by and from the shareholders. It has also an Executive Committee comprising of H.G. Dr. Mathews Mar Apherem as the Chairman Sri. A.G. George as the Vice Chairman, Dr. Winny Varghese as the Secretary, Sri. George K Peter as the Treasurer, and Sri. M.M. Issac, Dr. George Issac, Dr. Benny Alexandar (Principal Mar Baselious College, Adimali), Dr. Manju Kurian, [Principal,

Mar Athanasius College (Autonomous)], Dr. Bos Mathew Jos, [Principal-in-charge, Mar Athanasius College of Engineering (Autonomous)], and Mrs. Anitha George, [Principal, Mar Athanasius International School] as the members.

6. ADMISSION AND COURSE DETAILS

6.1 ADMISSION RULES

The admission to postgraduate and undergraduate programmes is based on the rules and regulations of UGC, Government of Kerala and MG University, Kottayam. Students can apply online for UG and PG programmes through the common admission portal of the college. 80% seats of the aided courses are based on merit and the remaining 20% seats are filled by the management. 50% seats of the self -financing courses are merit based and the remaining 50% seats are filled by the management. The course fee is based on the rules and regulations of the Government of Kerala and Mahatma Gandhi University.

6.2. ADMISSION PROCESS

The rank list of each programme is prepared on the basis of index marks. Provisional rank lists are published initially on college website and on the college notice board. Corrections or clarifications, if any, could be

raised before the foresaid dates in the prospectus. Final rank lists are published on the college website and also on the college notice board on the date given in the prospectus. Notifications for eligible candidates are sent via email and/or through SMS. Certificate verification of the candidates is conducted in the order in which they are listed in the rank list

6.3. FEE CONCESSION

Students belonging to the SC, ST, OEC and converts from these communities are eligible for full fee concession, lump sum grant for purchase of books, free boarding and lodging charges in college hostels or other Government hostels or monthly stipend at the rate fixed by the Government from time to time. All students having an annual family income less than Rs. 1,00,000 are eligible for KPCR fee concession.

6.4 ATTENDANCE

Attendance shall be marked at the beginning of each class, whether it is lecture, practical, composition or tutorial, by the teacher in-charge of the class. An attendance of 75% for boys and 73% for girls is mandatory to appear for End semester examinations. In the evaluation of internal assessment, attendance is mandatory for Under Graduate courses. Four percent of the total score is considered for attendance in the under graduate level. The students should occupy their respective seats before attendance is taken. They should not leave the classroom, nor reenter the class room without the permission of the teacher in-charge of the class.

6.5 LEAVE OF ABSENCE

Application for leave of absence should be made in the prescribed form with in 5 working days. It should be duly filled in and submitted by a student in person to his/her professor/teacher- in -charge. After obtaining the sanction for leave of absence from the class tutor and HOD, the application forms should be handed over to the clerk in-charge of attendance. A proper medical certificate should be submitted along with the leave application when the period of leave extends to more than five days or when it synchronizes with the date on which end semester or internal examinations are held. No student shall absent himself from the class without the sanction of leave. The student shall bear in mind that proper and timely submission of application for leave of absence is a pre-requisite for applying for exemption in case of shortage of attendance.

The students absenting themselves without leave for more than 15 consecutive working days will have their names removed from the rolls and if seeking re-admission, they shall have to pay all the fees. If temporarily removed, they need not pay the re-admission fee, provided they pay their

college fee on the due date. The duration of temporary removal may be prolonged as far as three months from the commencement of the period of absence, after which the student's name will be permanently removed from the rolls and he/she will have to pay the re-admission fees on joining.

It is the student's own responsibility to make sure that he/she has earned the attendance necessary for the year. Every student has to earn attendance of 75% for boys and 73% for girls in each semester. Attendance will be calculated by the number of hours present. If leave is required for the afternoon session only, the student should appear in person before the Head of the Department concerned and get the application for leave recommended by him/her. Only medical leaves sanctioned by the Principal in prescribed form within 5 days will be considered for condonation of shortage of attendance.

The Principal shall be the sole authority to condone such absence based on the commendation of the Head of the Department concerned. The students shall be eligible to continue his/her programme during the succeeding academic year only if he/she has secured 75% for boys and 73% for girls of attendance during the preceding year.

6.6 CLASS TUTORS

Each class will have a class tutor who will be a teaching faculty of the respective department and will be the in-charge of all activities concerning the class. The class tutor will guide the students for all their academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Each student of the class can reveal their concerns regarding academic, personal, interpersonal or any other problems to the class tutor and avail advice. All the submissions and applications to the Principal or HOD should be recommended by the class tutor.

6.7. MENTORS

Each class is divided into groups of 20 students. Each of these groups will have a mentor who will be a faculty member of the respective department. The mentor will have a close relationship with the students in their academic, personal and career matters.

6.8. INTERNAL ASSESSMENT PROGRAMME

Internal assessment programme has been introduced, by Mahatma Gandhi University, for undergraduate classes (since 1998 admission) and postgraduate classes (since 2001 admission). Accordingly, test papers, assignments and seminars will be conducted at regular intervals and a record of the marks obtained for the same by the students will be maintained by the teachers for internal assessments. Two test papers are to be conducted

in each semester for each course. Absence from a test paper will result in corresponding reduction in the internal assessment marks. Hence retests options are provided for the benefit of the students. The evaluations of all components are to be published and are to be acknowledged by the candidates.

6.9 END SEMESTER EXAMINATIONS

The external theory examination of all semesters shall be conducted at the end of each semester. For all UG courses without practical, total marks of external examination is 80 and total marks of internal evaluation is 20. For all UG courses with practicals total marks for external evaluation is 60 and total marks for internal evaluation is 15. For PG courses, both End Semester Evaluation (ESE) and Continuous Evaluation (CE) shall be carried out using direct grading system. The direct grading for CE (Internal) and ESE (External Evaluation) shall be based on 6 letter grades (A+, A, B, C, D and E) with numerical values of 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 and 0 respectively. Practical examinations shall be conducted at the end of each semester or at the end of even semesters as prescribed in the syllabus of the particular programme. The end semester examinations shall be of three hours duration.

7. RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE COLLEGE

Every student of the college shall carefully note the following rules and accepted traditions and respect them both in letter and spirit

7.1 ADMISSION AND WITHDRAWAL

1. All candidates for admission must acquaint themselves with the rules and regulations of the college and will be bound by them if admitted.
2. They must produce at the time of admission their Transfer Certificate and Certificate of Conduct from the school or the college which they last attended and mark sheet or their university pass certificate (if issued by the university) if they are applicants for admission to the B. A./B. Sc./B. Com. / B. Voc/M. A. / M.Sc. / M. Com. classes.
3. The Principal reserves the right to refuse admission to any applicant, without assigning reasons.
4. No candidate for admission will be enrolled or allowed to attend any class, until the prescribed fee is paid.
5. Anyone who is found later to have obtained admission by false representation is liable to be dismissed and the fees forfeited.
6. Any student who leaves the college without the prior permission of the Principal, before completing his/her programme will not receive

Certificate of Character. But on sufficient cause being shown, the Principal will transfer a student to another college, or will allow him to discontinue his/her studies and may give him a Certificate of Character.

7. Conduct Certificate must be applied for as soon as the student leaves the college.
8. No student shall be considered to have been enrolled in the college unless he/she has attended the college at least one day of that term or has paid the fees or portion there of prescribed.
9. A student who has discontinued his/her studies may be given his/her Higher Secondary Certificate or University Pass Certificate, and Transfer Certificate if he/ she pays the dues up to the end of the term which he/she has attended.
10. Those who wish to have any certificate sent to them by post are expected to send a stamped self-addressed (with PIN code) envelope of required size for the purpose.
11. No student who has not previously studied in any recognised school or college shall be admitted to the college.
12. Every transfer certificate issued to the students from a college or other institution after being registered for a university exam shall necessarily contain the following details:
 - a) Name of the examination of the university for which the student was resented from the college
 - b) Register number of the student and date of examination
 - c) Whether the student has appeared for the examination
 - d) If yes:
 - i. The parts and division in which the candidate has passed
 - ii. The parts and division in which the candidate has failed

Note:-

(a) Transfer certificate to a student who has been enrolled for a university exam shall be issued only after the provisional results of the exam are published and every such certificate shall contain the details of the parts or division in which he/she has passed and the parts or division in which he/she has failed. No student can be admitted to the college if the production of such a certificate is pending.

(b) The first October of every year has been fixed by the university as the last date for receipt of return of matriculants relating to students

admitted that year. Application of students for recognition of the qualifying examinations of other universities or examining bodies, admitted every year are to be received at the university office within one month after their joining the college.

(c) Application for Transfer Certificate shall be in the prescribed form.

13. In the case of students who have passed from any university other than the Mahatma Gandhi University, the necessary Migration Certificate/ No Objection Certificate must be produced within a month after enrolment.
14. Students of scheduled caste, scheduled tribes and other backward communities who are eligible for full fee concession and monthly stipend should produce the Nativity Certificate, Community Certificate and Income Certificate from revenue officers not below the rank of a village officer either along with their application for admission or on admission.
15. Certificates such as mark lists, degree certificates etc. of students, will not be kept in the college office for more than three years after completion of their programme of study.
16. Conduct Certificate is a document which the student has to earn. It will not be issued as a matter of course. Application for Conduct Certificate should be given as soon as the student leaves the college.

7.2. CONDUCT, DRESS, BEHAVIOUR AND DISCIPLINE

1. No student shall indulge in smoking, drinking liquor, use of drugs or other reprehensible habits within the college premises. Students should not fold up their dhotis in the college premises and they should refrain from sitting and standing on staircases, leaning against the parapet or loitering idly on the verandahs.
2. No student shall enter or leave the class without the permission of the teacher until the class is dismissed.
3. Writing or making marks on the walls or on furniture, dumping waste of any kind anywhere except in waste bin and spoiling the floor of the college or hostel building etc. are strictly prohibited.
4. Students are not permitted to join or work for any organisation outside the college without the written permission of the Principal.
5. Students are warned against presenting mass petitions to the Principal. They can make representations regarding college affairs to the higher authorities if necessary through the Principal.

6. Except in the meeting of various associations of the college, no student shall address any gathering within the college premises unless permitted by the Principal.
7. Prior permission of the Principal has to be obtained for the use of megaphone, loudspeakers, posters, banners or boards within the college premises if such a situation arises for its use.
8. When a student has any doubt in any matter of college discipline, he should consult the Principal before making a decision.
9. The loss or damage caused to the property and assets or articles of the college will be recovered from the student responsible for it.
10. Students have to be clean and decorous in dress, language and behaviour. Objectionable appearance will not be permitted.
11. No student shall enter a class other than his/her own without the permission of the Principal or the staff members whether it is before, during or after the college working hours.
12. When a teacher or a guest enters a class all students should rise in respect and remain standing until they are asked to be seated.
13. Students are not to enter any laboratory without the permission of the staff member in-charge.
14. Order and restraint should characterize conduct of the students at all times. Perfect silence should be maintained in the library, lecture classes and laboratories.
15. Students are warned against disfiguring college walls, desks or benches with writing or engraving of any description whatsoever and tampering with or damaging fittings, articles of furniture or library books.
16. Students are not to participate in (a) any agitation directed against constituted authority (b) any meeting likely to excite disloyalty or disaffection towards the government (c) any movement likely to promote communal ill-feeling.
17. The actual loss caused to furniture, tools and apparatus of the college during strikes or any violent action of students will be recovered by imposing collective fines on all students of the college (as per government order).

The management of Mar Athanasius College (Autonomous), Kothamangalam has decided to implement the following rules and

regulations in order to facilitate smooth and effective functioning of the college:

- i. All the students in the college are expected to be polite, well-behaved and respect the Teaching, Non-teaching, Administrative and all other personnel of the college in general. The students should co-operate with the college authorities to maintain discipline in the college.
- ii. Students should show self-respect, responsibility and respect other students irrespective of gender.
- iii. Students should not provoke or harass their fellow students in any way, and in general do not endanger the lives or the bodily integrity of any person.
- iv. The authorized media of communication between the students and college is the notice boards and the college website. The students are expected to read the notice boards regularly. The college will not be responsible for any loss of information to students due to their negligence.
- v. No student shall bring into the college campus any banner, flag, board, notice, pamphlet etc. for the purpose of any political activity.
- vi. Political activities - strikes, demonstrations, dharnas, hartals and the like are completely banned in the college campus. Students involving themselves in any kind of political activity in the college campus are liable to be summarily dismissed from the college.
- vii. Students shall not respond to any call for any form of strike or agitation including slogan shouting, dharna, gherao and shall not obstruct entry of fellow students to the college or indulge in anything which may cause disruption to classes or may harm the peaceful atmosphere of the institution. If any student violates the above regulation, he is liable to be dismissed from the college summarily.
- viii. The students are prohibited from taking part in any meeting in the college campus unless such meetings are convened and organized by the college authorities.
- ix. No student shall circulate any notice or petition of any kind, display posters, banners or boards, use megaphone/

- loudspeaker, paste or write anything in the campus and premises or collect money without the permission of the Principal.
- x. Students are prohibited from indulging in anti-institutional, anti-national, anti-social, communal and immoral or political activities and expressions within the campus and the hostels.
 - xi. Students who are charged in criminal offense or under suspension will not be allowed to enter the college campus without the permission of the Principal.
 - xii. Use of cell phones in the campus by the students is restricted to academic activities.
 - xiii. Any students who is persistently insubordinate, guilty of malpractice in connection with examinations or is likely to have an unwholesome influence over his fellow students shall be removed from the rolls. The removal shall be either temporary or permanent according to the gravity of the offence.
 - xiv. Students should park their vehicles only in the prescribed parking area. The institute will not be responsible for the security of the vehicles. Students should obey all the government traffic rules inside and outside the campus. Defaulters within the campus will be penalized.
 - xv. Social media should be used with utmost care and security. Students making any derogatory remarks about the college and college authority is liable to be dismissed from the college.

Waste Management in the College Campus

All students of the college are requested to keep the college campus neat and clean. Proper waste management is necessary for healthy college environment.

Please ensure the following points

- 1. Students should use cloth towels to cover the lunch box to reduce paper waste.
- 2. Refrain from bringing or ordering parcel food on the college premises
- 3. Proper segregation of waste into different categories (paper, plastic, glass, metal), organic waste (food scraps, plant material). Separate

bins are provided in designated areas across the campus for each category and avoid mixing them.

4. **Avoid Littering:** Be mindful of where you dispose of waste. Always use trash bins and avoid littering on the campus grounds or surrounding areas.

Any violation of these waste management guidelines will be subject to a fine of Rs. 50.

7.3. IDENTITY CARDS

Every student should wear visibly the identity card issued from the college at the time of admission. Students should produce their identity cards for inspection if demanded by the members of the staff or other authorities of the college. The identity cards must also be presented at the time of payment of each instalment of fees. A fine of Rs. 50/- will be levied from the students who do not wear their ID cards. It must be produced compulsorily on the day of college election and on other days as deemed fit by the Principal for entry into the college quadrangle.

If the card is lost, a duplicate may be issued on payment of the required fee, with the special permission of the Principal. Application for the duplicate card has to be made by the parent/guardian of the student.

8. PROHIBITION OF RAGGING

Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited within and outside the college campus. The Kerala Prohibition of Ragging Act 1998 prohibits ragging in educational institutions in Kerala. Those who are involved in ragging will have to face severe consequences including expulsion from the college/ criminal proceedings as per rules.

8.1. THE KERALA PROHIBITION OF RAGGING ACT, 1998 (Act 10 of 1998)

An Act to prohibit ragging in educational institutions in the State of Kerala

Preamble: -Whereas it is expedient to prohibit ragging in educational institutions in the State of Kerala;

1. Short title, extent and commencement-

- (1) This Act may be called the Kerala Prohibition of Ragging Act, 1998.

- (2) It extends to the whole of the State of Kerala.

- (3) It shall be deemed to have come into force on the 23rd day of October 1997.

2. Definition-In this Act, unless the context otherwise required: -
 - (a) 'head of the educational institution' means the Principal or the Headmaster or the person responsible for the management of that educational institution;
 - (b) 'Ragging' means doing of any act, by disorderly conduct, to a student of an educational institution, which causes or is likely to cause physical or psychological harm or raising apprehension or fear or shame or embarrassment to that student and includes-
 - (i) teasing, abusing or playing practical jokes on, or causing hurt to, such student; or
 - (ii) asking a student to do any act or perform something which such student will not, in the ordinary course, willingly, do.
3. Prohibition of ragging- Ragging within or outside any educational institution is prohibited
4. Penalty for ragging- Whoever commits, participates in, abets or propagates ragging within, or outside, any educational institution shall, on conviction, be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two years and shall also be liable to a fine which may extend to ten thousand rupees.
5. Dismissal of student- Any student convicted of an offence under Section 4 shall be dismissed from the educational institution and such student shall not be admitted in any other educational institution for a period of three years from the date of order of such dismissal.
6. Suspension of student-
 - (1) Whenever any student or, as the case may be, the parents or guardian, or a teacher of an educational institution complains, in writing, of ragging to the head of the educational institution, the head of that educational institution shall, without prejudice to the foregoing provisions, within seven days of the receipt of the complaint, enquire into the matter mentioned in the complaint and, if, prima facie, it is found true, suspend the student who is accused of the offence, and shall, immediately, forward the complaint to the police station having jurisdiction over the area in which the educational institution is situated, for further action.
 - (2) Where, on enquiry by the head of the educational institution, it is proved that there is no substance prima facie in the complaint received under sub-section (1), he shall intimate the fact, in writing, to the complainant.

7. Deemed abetment- If the head of the educational institution fails or neglects to take action in the manner specified in section 6 when a complaint of ragging is made, such person shall be deemed to have abetted the offence of ragging and shall, on conviction, be punished as provided for in Section 4.
8. Power to make rules-
 - (1) The Government may, by notification in the Gazette, make rules for carrying out all or any of the purposes of this Act.
 - (2) Every rule made under this Act shall be laid, as soon as maybe after it is made, before the Legislative Assembly, while it is in session for a total period of fourteen days, which may be comprised in one session or in two successive sessions, and if before the expiry of the session in which it is so laid, or the session immediately following, the Legislative Assembly makes any modification in the rule or decides that the rule should not be made, the rule shall, thereafter, have effect only in such modified form or be of no effect, as the case may be; so, however, that any such modification or annulment shall be without prejudice to the validity of anything previously done under that rule.
9. Repeal and saving-
 - (1) The Kerala Prohibition of Ragging Ordinance, 1998 (2 of 1998), is hereby repealed.
 - (2) Notwithstanding such repeal, anything done or deemed to have been done or any action taken or deemed to have been taken under the said Ordinance shall be deemed to have been done or taken under this Act.

8.2. ANTI-RAGGING CELL

The Anti-Ragging Cell of the institution has the following objectives:

- i. To keep watch over ragging so as to prevent its occurrence and recurrence.
- ii. To strictly deal with the incidents of ragging brought to our notice.
- iii. To generate an atmosphere of discipline by sending a clear message that no act of ragging shall be tolerated in the campus. The committee and the squad ensure a ragging free environment in the college campus.

The cell shall take an appropriate decision, in regard to punishment or otherwise, depending on the facts of each incident of ragging and nature

and gravity of the incident of ragging established in the recommendations of the Anti-Ragging Squad. The Anti-Ragging Committee may, depending on the nature and gravity of the guilt established by the Anti-Ragging Squad, award to those found guilty, one or more of the following punishments, namely;

- a) Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges.
- b) Withholding/withdrawing scholarship/fellowship and other benefits.
- c) Debarring from appearing in any test/ examination or other evaluation process.
- d) Withholding the results.
- e) Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.
- f) Suspension/ expulsion from the hostel.
- g) Cancellation of admission.
- h) Rustication from the institution for period ranging from one to four semesters.
- i) Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for a specified period.

Provided that where the persons committing or abetting the act of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment.

9. HOSTEL FACILITIES

9.1. RESIDENCE OF STUDENTS

1. Every student should get his/her residence approved by the Principal at the time of admission if he/she is not residing with his/her parents/guardian and whenever any change is desired by him/her and prior permission of the Principal should be obtained before admission is confirmed. Violation of this rule is a serious breach of discipline.

2. Students who are found living in unapproved lodgings will be liable to face disciplinary action which is tantamount to expulsion from the college.

9.2. LADIES' HOSTEL

The two ladies' hostels of the college have facilities for accommodating 200 students. Application for admission should be addressed to the Chief Warden, Mar Athanasius College (Autonomous), Kothamangalam. It should be made in the prescribed form, copies of which may be had from the hostel office or college office on payment of Rs.30/-.

The chief warden will have the right to refuse admission to any applicant without assigning any reasons. Selection of students for admission to the hostel is made by a committee. The hostel functions under 24 hours faultless security cover.

9.3. MEN'S HOSTEL (SPORTS)

Men's hostel is provided for the sports students. Maximum intake of the hostel is 150 students. Kerala State Sports Council has granted a hostel scheme for students of Athletics and Aquatics. During the 2023-24 academic year, the Kerala State Sports Council has recommended 41 students to this scheme. Of this 6 are boys and they are accommodated in the hostel. The management, in 2023-24, provides scholarship for 103 students and 2 Khelo India sponsored sports students are accommodated in the hostel.

9.4. HAILE SELASSIE INTERNATIONAL HOSTEL FOR MEN

Newly built Men's hostel with international standard can accommodate 50 students. Application for admission should be addressed to the chief warden, Dr. Siju T. Thomas Asst. Professor, Department of Botany.

9.5. RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR HOSTEL INMATES.

Students who reside in the hostel are expected to strictly abide by its rules and regulations.

1. Behave courteously and fairly with everyone, both inside and outside the hostel.
2. Attend all classes/academic programmes in the college regularly and punctually.
3. Co-operate to maintain the hostel rooms and premises neat and tidy.
4. Students should be inside the hostel before the time prescribed by the authorities and no student is permitted to be in the terrace after 6.00 p.m.
5. Keep the rooms locked and hang their keys in the key board while leaving the room

6. Switch off lights and fans when not required and close the water taps after use.
7. Adhere to the timings of the hostel and mess.
8. Do not shift any furniture from their rooms allotted.
9. Do not paste any poster / pictures etc. anywhere in the hostel.
10. The use of electrical appliances such as immersion heater, electric stove, iron box etc. and audio/video systems is banned in the hostel.
11. Inmates are not permitted to keep mobile in person. They will deposit the mobiles with the matron and will be permitted to take them at stipulated timings for charging.
12. Use of personal computers / laptops is permitted only for academic purpose. The inmates using these will pay an additional fee as decided from time to time towards electricity every month.
13. For proceeding on weekends / leave permission of the matron and Chief Warden should be obtained.
14. Inmates are permitted to arrange any function or meeting in the hostel only with the permission of the Chief Warden
15. Inmates shall not bring food items from mess / outside to their rooms.
16. Permission of Chief Warden / matron is essential for bringing guests to the hostel and this should be recorded in the guest register.
17. Prior sanction of warden/manager is essential for being absent and this should be strictly recorded in the movement register maintained in the security room/manager room. Unauthorised absence will lead to expulsion from the hostel.
18. Students are not permitted to go for any tour/visits without the permission of the authorities and parents.
19. Do not make any disturbances to other hostel mates.
20. Silence hours should be maintained strictly between 10.30 pm and 6.30 am.
21. Any complaint / suggestion regarding food and water should be brought to the immediate notice of the hostel secretary / matron / Chief warden.
22. Intimate the chief warden if the students are under any medication or treatment at the time of admission.
23. The inmates shall be eligible for mess rebate only when an inmate is away on academic reasons or medical grounds for more than three

days continuously and with prior approval of the college authorities or warden.

24. Room rent will be collected on monthly basis even if stay is not for full month.
25. Remit the hostel bill on or before 15th of the following month.
26. The inmates will have to vacate the hostel when the college closes for any reason
27. The right of stay of an inmate in the hostel shall cease when the regular classes of the final semester is over.
28. The right of stay of an inmate in the, hostel shall automatically cease if any disciplinary action is initiated against them by the college authorities.
29. Violation of any of the above rules will automatically cease the right of stay of an inmate in the hostel.

10. M. P. VARGHESE LIBRARY

The library of Mar Athanasius college is named after Prof. M. P. Varghese, the doyen of education, an economist and great visionary. It is housed in an exclusive three storied building having 25,194 sq.ft. space. A spacious section for periodicals, network resource centre, reference section and stack area ensures readers' comfort in the library.

M. P. Varghese library holds the unique record of being the first automated college library in Kerala and the first college library to have internet facility. The library has a comprehensive collection of print, digital and multimedia resources on academic subjects. It has in store 72093 Books, 54 Periodicals, 35 Journals and 13 Newspapers. Over 6000 + e-journals and 199500+ e-books are also provided.

10.1. LIBRARY RULES

- Strict silence, dignity and decorum must be observed in the library and its premises.
- Members should write their name and other details and sign in the visitors' register kept in the library at the time of entry into the library.
- Identity Card is mandatory for getting access to the library. It should be worn in such a way so that it is visible to the library staff.
- Identity Cards are strictly non-transferable.
- Members are responsible for the books and other materials borrowed on their card. Loss of the Identity card should be reported immediately to the librarian.

- Personal belongings such as bags, files, umbrellas, gadget covers, text books, issued books & other printed materials etc must be left at the property counter. The library will not accept responsibility for the loss or damage to the personal property left in its premises.
- One note book may be allowed on request to facilitate taking down notes. Members should show the note book which is being taken out of the library to the staff at the counters.
- Members should check the books and other materials before they are taken out of the library in order to report mutilation or damage if any. If the books are lost, the members should replace the books of the same edition or latest edition. Loss of books should be reported to the librarian immediately.
- Members are required to handle the books and other materials very carefully. Marking, writing, highlighting, underlining, tearing, damage caused by dog-earing of the pages etc. will be viewed very seriously.
- Students will be permitted to take a maximum of two books at a time.
- Issued books are not transferable.
- Renewal and reservation facilities are available.
- Members should not misplace or replace the books in the shelf.
- The librarian may recall any book from any member at any time and the members shall return the same immediately.
- For the late return of books and other materials an over due charge will be levied.
- Each member should obtain a No Dues certificate from the library after returning all the books issued, surrendering the Identity cards and after paying outstanding dues if any.

11. RULES FOR THE COLLECTION AND REFUND OF FEES

11.1 Mode of Collection of Tuition Fees:

Tuition fees will be collected semester-wise, as per dates notified by the Principal in the months falling within the two semesters as shown below:

1st Sem: - June, July, August, September and October.

2nd Sem: - November, December, January, February and March.

First year students will have to remit the full tuition fees for the academic year / first semester fee, at the time of admission.

11.2. Change in Fee Dates

The Principal is competent to change the fee dates for a particular class/classes and fix it to an earlier or subsequent date if it so happens

that the college is ordered to remain closed by the competent authority on that particular date originally proposed for collection of fees. In such cases a copy of the notice of the Principal, notifying change in fee date should be retained and produced for audit purpose.

11.3 Payment of Fine for Default:

If any student fails to pay the tuition fees or special fees by the due date he / she shall be liable to pay a fine along with fees or special fees on or before the 10th day after the due date. If the 10th day happens to be a holiday, the next working day will be counted as the 10th day.

11.4 Consequences of Non-payment of Fees:

If the fees or special fees with the fine is not paid on or before the last date fixed for the fine, superfine shall have to be paid. If the fees and fines if any, of an instalment are not paid within the specified time, the name of the student will be removed from the rolls of the college w.e.f. the date following the expiry of this period and the student will not get the benefit of attendance from the date of removal from the rolls of the college. If the student is to be re-admitted he/she shall have to apply to the Principal for special permission and also has to remit all the arrears of fees with fines. Fee of Rs. 50/- will be collected in such cases of re-admission. The re-admitted students will get the benefit of attendance only from the date of re-admission.

11.5 Explanation:

The last opportunity for payment of an instalment of fee mentioned in para iv. above is defined as the last working day prior to the due date of the succeeding instalment. But in the case of the last semester fee, i.e. the fee due for February, the last opportunity is fixed as 5th March. If the 5th of March happens to be a holiday then the last working day previous to such a date will be considered as the last opportunity.

11.6 Publication of the names of defaulters:

The names of defaulters of semester fee will be published in the notice board immediately after the last opportunity fixed for the payment of the semester fee.

11.7 Payment of Fees in certain other cases:

Students who are admitted for a semester for making up shortage of attendance for the programme which the student was undergoing, should pay one-third of the tuition fees for the year together with full special fee and caution deposit at the time of admission. Only the former students of the college shall be admitted as semester students.

11.8 Payment of Fees by casual students:

In the case of a casual student, all fees including special fees and caution deposit due for the whole year will be collected at the time of admission.

11.9. Refund of fees

Fee once paid in the college office and thus remitted to Treasury cannot be refunded; instead a remittance certificate may be issued to the students who have failed to attend classes.

11.10. Collection of Fees.

Fee will be received in the college office only on days fixed for collection during office hours upto 3pm. If the student does not pay the dues till the last date prescribed, he / she will not be allowed to appear for the examination.

Note:-Rules concerning the collection of fees will be subject to University / Government orders.

- N.B.**
- (i) The student should keep in safe custody the receipt issued on remittance of Caution Deposit. The caution deposit amount will be refunded only if the caution deposit receipt is produced along with the application for refund of caution deposit.
 - (ii) Late fee at the rate of Rs. 55/- will be collected from the students who obtain T.C. after one year of the completion of the programme.

17 STUDENT ORIENTED ACTIVITIES

17.1 NATIONAL CADET CORPS (NCC)

The 'Aims' of the NCC laid out in 1988 have stood the test of time and continue to meet the requirements expected of it in the current socio-economic scenario of the country. The NCC aims at developing character, comradeship, discipline, a secular outlook, the spirit of adventure, and ideals of selfless service amongst young citizens. Further, it aims at creating a pool of organized, trained, and motivated youth with leadership qualities in all walks of life, who will serve the Nation regardless of which career they choose. Needless to say, the NCC also provides an environment conducive to motivating young Indians to join the armed forces.

The NCC provides exposure to the cadets in a wide range of activities, with a distinct emphasis on Social Services, Discipline, and Adventure Training. It has emerged as the biggest uniformed youth organization of the country symbolizing its motto Unity and Discipline.

The expenditure of the Program is shared by both Central and State Governments.

The NCC is open to all regular students of schools and colleges voluntarily. The officers and cadets have no liability for active military service.

The Corps which started in a small way with a cadet strength of 1.67 lakhs (only 32,500 Senior Division and 1,35,00 Junior Division cadets) has now grown to 13 lakhs. While this figure by itself is quite substantial, it covers only 3.8% of the eligible student population of our country.

During the 1965 and 1971 wars with Pakistan, NCC cadets were the second line of defence. They organised camps to assist the ordinary factories, supplying arms

and ammunition to the front, and also were used as patrol parties to assist in capturing the enemy Paratroopers. The NCC cadets also worked hand-in-hand with the Civil Defence authorities and actively took part in rescue work and Traffic Control.

After the 1971 Indo-Pak War, the NCC syllabus was revised. Rather than training to become the second line of defence, the NCC syllabus laid greater stress on developing qualities of leadership and Officer-like qualities. The military training which the NCC cadets received was reduced and greater importance was given to other areas like social service and youth management.

NCC is not an organisation which serves as a ‘feeder’ for the entry of students into the Defence Services. It is an organisation to make them useful citizens of the country, irrespective of the vocation they may choose on completion of their studies. Hence, NCC activities are only a ‘means to an end; the ‘end’ being the achievement of the “Aims of NCC” in the context of the students.

17.2 NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (N.S.S.)

Gender Sensitization Club makes the young boys and girls gender sensitive, and creates positive values that support women's rights. It provides guidance to the students to understand the social and cultural constructions of gender that shape the experiences of women and men in society.

17.14. SCIENCE FORUM

Science Forum plays an active role in developing a scientific attitude among students through a number of programmes and campaigns. The forum organises various programmes to keep the students in touch with the recent advances in science. It provides a platform for the students to interact with eminent scientists and environmentalists.

17.15. GREENARY AND NATURE CLUB / BHOOMIMITHRA SENA

Protection of the environment is the primary concern of the club. The Club generate awareness among students about the current environmental issues and the importance of planting trees. Seminars and lectures are frequently conducted and environment friendly activities are also organized.

17.16. ROAD SAFETY CLUB

Road Safety Club is constituted in the college for involving the student community in road safety activities and to create awareness on road use. The club educates road users about traffic rules and regulations. It develops skills among the students for assisting in the enforcement of traffic rules. By organising classes by experts from the motor vehicles department, the club develops skill among the students for taking appropriate action in various traffic situations.

17.17. YOUTH RED CROSS

Inculcation of humanitarian values, protection of life and health and enhancement of leadership skills are the main objectives of Youth Red Cross.

17.18. DISASTER MANAGEMENT CELL

It assesses the educational needs of differently abled persons enrolled in the college to determine the types of assistive devices to be procured.

17.20. MGJSM

MGJSM is a Students' movement and a spiritual organization under the Jacobite Syrian Christian Association. MGJSM works for the development of manifold activities focusing on spiritual, mental, cultural, social and educational fields.

17.21. ENERGY CELL

The Energy Cell organizes various programmes on energy conservation. The cell enables the students to carryout energy audits by themselves.

17.22. SPORTS AND GAMES

Mar Athanasius Academy has got its name in golden letters in the field of Sports and Games. The students have made outstanding achievements in international, national and university level competitions. The training and facilities given in the academy are remarkable. The management has instituted scholarships for the enhancement of sports in the campus. In recognition of achievements in sports, Sports Authority of India (SAI) selected Mar Athanasius College as its extension centre. The institution has a full-fledged physical education department, which provides the facilities for all the major games like football, Volleyball, Basketball and Cricket.

Facilities for games are provided in the hostels as well. The college has a football cum cricket ground, one volley ball court, two tennis courts, two basketball courts, and three badminton courts.
